<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The North Sea is located on the East coast. Erosion is a major problem on the East coast. Bridlington is a coastal town located on the Holderness coast. The Holderness coast is 61km long, running from Flamborough Head to Spurn Point. Flamborough Head, located North of Bridlington, is a chalk cliff suffering from high rates of erosion.
